Problem Sets

There will be 6 problem sets assigned. These will account for 10% of your final grade. The lowest score will be dropped for the final grade calculation. Hence, each problem set contributes 2% to the final grade.

Grading Policy

Each midterm exam accounts for 25% while the final exam accounts for 40% of your final grade.

Midterm1 (25%) + Midterm2 (25%) + Final (40%) + Homework (10%) = 100%

The grade distribution will be determined as follows:

- Roughly the top 15% of scores will be the A range, the next 25% will be the B range.
- The minimum passing grade (lowest D) for this course is 35% (35 out of the maximum 100 points).
- The lowest C- grade will be 50% (50 of the maximum 100 points). The remainder of the class receiving a total score of 50 or more will be divided equally between C+, C and C-.

Missed Exams

There will be no make-up (or early) exams for any missed midterms. If you must miss a midterm because of illness or other unavoidable circumstances, you will receive the score of the second midterm in place of the first or pro-rated score of the final in place of the second midterm.

If you must miss the final because of illness or other unavoidable circumstances, you might be able to take the final later. You may get an incomplete until the missed final is made up. Again, there will be no early exams.

All valid reasons must be supported by appropriate documentation. If you miss an exam without appropriate reason or documentation, you will receive zero for that exam.
